

## Style sheet

Papers should include an Abstract (max 150 words) and 5 keywords.

### Content

Title  
Abstract  
Keywords  
Text  
Bibliographical references

### Typographic information

Abstract should not exceed 15 lines. English version is required.

The text should be single spaced and should be divided into numbered paragraphs (arabic numerals).

Font: Palatino Linotype, pt 10. For Greek characters please use the font family Greek. Other font types should be used, if needed for special purposes, but they must be attached separately to the email. We recommend the use of SILDoulosIPA for phonetic symbols.

Short quotations should be incorporated into the text and enclosed in double quotation marks.

Quotations exceeding 3 lines should be typed in a separate indented paragraph (pt 9), avoiding quotation marks. Left and right indentation is set to 1 cm.

Footnotes (pt 8) should precede periods and commas and should be numbered consecutively throughout the manuscript with superscript Arabic numerals.

Double quotation marks are preferred (angle brackets should be avoided).

Capitals, bold and underlined characters should be avoided (they should be used only if necessary for special purposes).

Bibliographical references in-text should follow the Author-date system, e.g.: (Verdi, 2000: 32-39).

Figures and tables should be centred (max. 10 cm in width), captions should follow each figure/table.

Hyperlinks must be all black and should not be underlined.

Page numbers will be added later, avoid footers or headers.

### Bibliographical references

All references cited in the text should appear in the list of References. The references should be alphabetized by first author; multiple articles with the *same* author (or co-author) are then listed in chronological order.

#### Books:

Surname, Name, Year, *Title*, Place, Publisher.

e.g.

Hurford, James, 2007, *The Origins of Meaning: Language in the Light of Evolution*, Oxford, Oxford University Press.

#### Articles in Journals:

Surname, Name, Year, "Title", *Name of the journal*, Number: Pages.

e.g.

Geissmann, Thomas, 1999, "Duet songs of the siamang, *Hylobates syndactylus*: II. Testing the pair-bonding hypothesis during a partner exchange", in *Behaviour*, 136: 1005-1039.

#### Articles in Book:

Surname, Name, Year, "Title", in Surname, Name initial/s of the author/s of the book + (ed/s), *Title of the book*, Place, Publisher, pages.

e.g.

Crystal, David, 1976, "Paralinguistic behaviour as continuity between animal and human communication", in McCormack, W. S. & Wurm, S. A. (eds), *Language and man: anthropological issues*, The Hague, Mouton, 13-27.
